Top Tips for Families – Online APPs

Some apps, sites and games online have age restrictions. Getting to grips with all the different age ratings can be a nightmare. Here's our guide to the main ones.

Our top tip, though, is to check out the terms and conditions for sites your children are using or want to use.

OK for under-13s

Why 13? A lot of very popular sites and apps make 13 the minimum age for users. This is because the United States passed a law in 1998 that said that companies could not collect data from children under the age of 13 without their parents' permission. The expense and work involved led many companies to restrict their services to over-13s.

These are services that are either designed for children aged under 13, or are specifically designed to be used by under-13s providing they have parental consent:

Popjam This service is available for use by children aged under 13. Their terms explain that if a child is younger than 13, they need the consent of a parent or legal guardian before giving out any personal information when they register. In some countries (including the US), Popjam may also separately contact parents or legal guardians to get consent and verification before a child uses their services or provides personal information. They would not be required or expected to do this in the UK.

Club Penguin A site specifically for under-13s, with parental consent required.

Moshi Monsters A site specifically for under-13s, with parental consent required.

Over-13s only

Some of the best-known sites on the web are for over 13s only. As we have seen, this is because of American law, which specifies that anyone under 13 is a child, as far as collecting their data is concerned. (They must get their parents' permission.) In the UK, under-13s registering for these sites aren't breaking UK law but they are breaching the terms and conditions of the website.

It's also worth remembering that because these sites are designed for over-13s, they won't necessarily have procedures in place to make them suitable places for younger children. These sites include:

Google To have a Google+ account and access all their main services including YouTube and Gmail you need to be over 13. However, if your child is under-13 they can still use these services, but they won't be able to create an account or upload content.

Facebook You need to be 13 to have a Facebook account. It is a violation of their terms and conditions to create an account for someone under 13.

Twitter It's not easy to find how old you have to be to use Twitter. The information they provide for parents doesn't specify an age nor does the information for teens. However, in their privacy policy they say that their services are not directed to persons under 13.

Instagram You need to be over 13 to use Instagram.

Ask.fm This site requires users to have parental consent if they are under the age of majority, which, in the UK, is 18. In any instance they require users to be over 13. It is important to be aware that when a child signs up for this service they simply have to affirm that they have parental consent if they are between the ages of 13 and 18. A child entering their age as under 13 won't be able to create an account.

Snapchat You need to be over 13 to have a Snapchat account. However, some features are limited to over-18s and to use those you have to affirm that you are either over 18 or have parental consent. At the moment, those features are only available in the US.


Spotify You cannot use Spotify if you are under 13 and anyone between the ages of 13 and 18 is required to have parental consent (not something Spotify checks).

WhatsApp This app used to require users to be 16 and over but has changed its terms and conditions so it now says it is for 13 and over.

Over-18s

Most of the sites that fall into this category are the ones that are obviously for age-restricted products or services, mainly gambling and adult content.

It isn't at all safe to assume that because a site is supposed to be for over 18-year-olds that anyone will take proper steps to prevent under 18s using it. Many pornography sites are freely accessible to under-18s.



What parents need to know

Twitch is a gaming-focussed live-streaming service, owned by Amazon, where you can watch others play games live and listen to commentary as they play. It has 15 million daily active users and more than three million people live broadcast video game streams and other content on Twitch, with channels dedicated to just about every popular video game imaginable – both modern and retro. There are also shows that feature gaming competitions, professional tournaments, game related chat and news. Plus, numerous non-gaming channels covering everything from cookery and music to art and travel. But Twitch is not just about watching other people's shows – anyone can broadcast their own gaming action.

THE RISK - IT'S LIVE & UNCENSORED As gamers get engrossed in their games, it is very common to hear rather choice words, so the chance of your child encountering swear words and bad language is extremely high. There is not only the language of the person running the stream that you need to consider, but also the language of other Twitch users in the text-based chat that accompanies streams.

What parents can do There's not much you can do to reduce exposure to bad language on Twitch, but if there are any troublesome users, it is possible to block them. It is a good idea to spend a little time with your child as they explore different channels on the platform, as this will give you an idea of the sort of content they are being exposed to. As Twitch does not offer any parental control options, this is the best way to police what your child is doing. If your child is overwhelmed or disturbed by comments that are being posted in the stream chat, it is possible to hide it from view by clicking the little arrow to the right of the Subscribe button.

THE RISK - UNWANTED CONTACT FROM OTHER USERS Just like any website or platform with a social element to it, there is the risk that your child will not only come into contact with the sort of people you might rather they didn't, but also that they could be harassed, groomed or bullied online.

What parents can do

It's worth noting that this option only blocks messages by those who are not 'your friend, someone you follow, someone you subscribe to, one of your mods, or one of your editors'. Taking things further, it is possible to completely block users who become problematic. Show your child how to make use of this option by clicking on a user's name and in the little speech bubble to block them. If your child wishes to report the user to Twitch, click the three dots button beneath the block option and click Report.

THE RISK-WEBCAM SHARING

As well as seeing streaming footage of games, Twitch also lets users share their webcam, so people can see them. This gives yet another way for people to share inappropriate content, and it also gives another way for streamers to subject your child to advertising, sponsored content and product placement.

What parents can do Getting involved in your child's use of which is the best way to keep an eye on the sort of content they are consuming and intervene if anything inappropriate crops up. THE RISK - POTENTIAL COSTS By default, Twitch is ad-supported, but there is a month subscription option - called Twitch Turbo - that offers ar ad-free experience. On top of this, it is possible to subscription to individually. There's also Twitch Prime, a premium experience included with the Amazon Prime and Prime wideo subscription memberships, which offers bonus gam and exclusive in game content and Twitch Merch - an onli is tore offering merchandise, such as T-shirts and hoodies Twitch Bits is a virtual currency that gives your child the power to encourage and show support for streamers -through 'cheers' - and get attention in chat through animated emoticons. Bits cost real money and there's one sociould very quickly mount up the more involved your child gets into Twitch.

What parents can do Take steps to restrict access to your credit/debit card, as well as your PayPal account, to avoid getting hit by a large bill. If you are able to access your child's Twitch account, it is possible to check their purchase history, so you can see if they are spending too much money on subscriptions or donations. Explain to your child that subscribing to channels and purchasing Bits for cheers is optional, and that they can watch and enjoy a stream without doing either.

THE RISK - TWITCH EMOTES h's interactive chat feature is littered with emotic motes', which for first time users will be complete wildering. They typically feature faces of notable mery, Twitch employees or fictional characters, si streamers, Twitch employees or fictional characters, such as a grey-scale photograph of a game developer known as kappa, which is often used in Twitch chat as a symbol of sarcasm or mockery. Your child may be upset or sensitive if they are the target of negative emotes while chatting with other gamers, or they may find some emoticons offensive.

Chat to your child about how they use Twitch and show an interest in understanding how it works. There are lots of online guides to Twitch emotes if your really want to get clued up on what your child is talking about in chats. Witch's terms of service dictate that emotes must not be used for harassment - defined by 'targeted insults, defamation, intimidation, and threats of any nature. If your child finds an emoticon that violates guidelines, they can report it via the 'User Report' tool. Channel owners can also add specific emotes to their 'Channel Banned Words' list.

Kik (or Kik Messenger) is a free messaging app used by 300 million people worldwide that lets users exchange messages, photos, videos, GIFs and webpages via a Wi-Fi connection or data plan. Kik is unusual in that your child can sign up without a phone number and then find and message other people via just their username. Kik is aimed at anyone aged 13 years and older – the app says teens between 13 and 18 years old will need parental permission but it does not verify ages.



Snapchat is a messaging app.

Users can take photos, record videos, add text or drawings and send them to friends. These Snaps will disappear after viewing, or within 24 hours (for a Story).

As with any social platform, sometimes Snapchat users can act in ways which may lead to others feeling offended, abused or left out. Users can always report abuse on Snapchat, can block offending users, or leave any group chat where they feel uncomfortable.

Share Snaps (images) or chat with friends. Explore news and entertainment from established publishers. Make video and voice calls. See where your friends are on the Snap Map.



13-17 year olds should have permission from a parent or legal guardian.



Useful tips 👘

- Check privacy settings to choose who can see your Snaps, your Stories or your location.
- Report safety concerns.
- Block users who make you uncomfortable.
- Only friend or accept friend requests from people you know in real life.

Users can capture photos or videos of the world around them and send them to friends, adding filters, lenses and stickers to these for fun and creative visual effects. Users can always choose who they are sharing Snaps or Stories with.

Twitter is a micro blogging service. Users can send messages no longer than 280 characters. Users express themselves, share stories, pictures and articles.



TikTok started as a lip-sync app, their most popular type of content. Users over 18 can 'gift' items to favourite content producers. Duets are popular.



How old you have to be to use it



All new TikTok accounts are public. No account is required to watch content. Users can make their account or video private. Gifting on TikTok involves coins and gifts with a real-world value. Because content is user-generated, younger children may see content intended for older users.
